Reduce your risk of fire at home

Learn how to stay safe by tackling the top five fire risks:


- (1) Cooking Never leave cooking unattended, especially with oil, and avoid drinking while cooking.
- (2) Electrical fires Use the correct charger and charge devices on hard surfaces.
- (3) Faulty appliances Don't run appliances like dryers or washing machines when out or asleep. Avoid extension leads for powerful devices.
- 4 Smoking Smoking is never permitted in your Almshouse.
- (5) Candles Use battery-powered lights. Never leave candles unattended.







RESIDENT SATISFACTION SURVEY


We are always looking for ways to improve and enhance our service, and your feedback is an essential and valuable aid. Here are some results from the 2025 survey (based on 35.1% return):

































PROPERLY DISPOSING OF WASTE

Exeter Homes Trust has been informed that a Beneficiary is disposing of their rubbish by placing it over the boundary wall to their estate.

Littering and fly-tipping are criminal offences under the Environmental Protection Act 1990 which can lead to fines, and in more serious cases, criminal convictions.

All residents are responsible for ensuring their food waste, general rubbish and recycling are disposed of carefully and appropriately in the correct bins. Waste should not be disposed of in any other manner on their estate.

General waste should be put in your black bin and recycling should be placed in the green bin. Please find below a summary of items that can and cannot be recycled in your green bin.

Items that can be put in the recycling:

- ☑ drink cans, food tins, aerosols, aluminium foil
- ☑ plastic drinks bottles, plastic household cleaning bottles, plastic food containers
- ☑ carrier bags, bread bags, polythene bags/film and bubble wrap
- ☑ paper, newspapers & magazines, cardboard, junk mail and envelopes, catalogues, phone directories and small amounts of shredded paper inside paper envelopes or paper bags

Items that must be taken to recycling banks or recycling centres:

- **☑** glass
- **☑** batteries
- ☑ nappies and pads
- ✓ mixed-material items, such as blister packs that contain foil and plastic
- ☑ wrapping paper and greetings cards
- ☑ pouches (for pet food, baby food, etc.)
- ☑ crisp packets and confectionery packets; clear bags/packets/film that springs open after being 'scrunched'
- **☑** cartons

If you have any queries regarding Exeter City Council's recycling policies, or if you require additional waste bins, please contact them directly.

Please also ensure you are not feeding any animals or birds in the communal grounds, especially seagulls, as this can create additional mess and attract other pests. Seagulls, rats and squirrels all carry various diseases including Leptospirosis and Salmonellosis.
